Lily: Do you want to sleep at my house tonight, Jane?

Jane: That's a good idea, Lily! I will ask my parents, but I

think they will say it's OK.

Lily: Good. Do you want to play video games or do you want to watch a movie?

Jane: I want to play video games. My mother **bought** me a new video game last night. I will bring it to your house.



Lily: Cool! Can you bring your new camera, too? We can look out my window and take pictures.

Jane: I'm sorry, Lily. I can't **bring** my camera. My uncle went to Europe last week and he **brought** my camera with him.

- * "Brought" and "bought" are past tense verbs. In English, we use the past tense to talk about things that happened before now.
- Use these <u>past tense verbs</u> to talk about what you did today and yesterday (before now).
