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
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- "Nana, I can't sleep."

- Picture the biggest kite under the sun."




"Nana, why should I picture this?"

- Picture the kite, or it's gone in a wink."




"Why should I picture a pink flying kite?"



"Because it will help you sleep."




"Picture it flying over the town."
