



# **Asking for Help**

# Let's Learn

Being able to ask for help is an important language skill. In this lesson, you will learn a few different ways to ask for help. You will also learn how to offer assistance to others and how to tell others you can't help.

# Warm-Up

## A HELPING HAND

In English, "a hand" sometimes means "help." You can say "I need a hand" when you need help. You can ask "Do you need a hand?" when others seem to need assistance. Have you offered a helping hand recently?

#### Note:

The phrase *to give a hand* can also mean to give a round of applause (to clap).

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# **Useful Expressions**

Listen to your teacher ask for and offer help. Then recite these phrases together as a class.

# **A. Questions**

#### **Asking for Help**

- Could you give me a hand?
- I could use some help.
- Help me, please.
- Do you have a minute?
- Would you mind lending me a hand?
- Can I ask a favor?
- Can you do me a favor?
- I have a favor to ask you.
- I need a big favor.
- Can you help me... (base verb)?
- Could you... (base verb) for me?

## **B. Responses**

#### **Agreeing to Help**

- Of course.
- No problem.
- Sure.

# Accepting Help

- Thank you!
- I appreciate it.
- Thanks for your help.
- You're the best.

## **Offering Help**

- Can I help you?
- Do you need a hand?
- What can I do for you?
- Is there anything I can do to help you?
- Is there anything else?
- Can I be of assistance?

#### **Declining Help**

- I'm okay, thanks.
- That's okay.
- Thanks for offering.
- I'm all right.
- I'm fine. Thanks, though.

## **ASKING FOR HELP**

- B: I'm okay. You could hold the door for me, though.
- A: No problem. Can I take something for you?
- B: That's okay. They aren't as heavy as they look.
- A: Is there anything else I can do?
- B: I'm fine. Thanks for offering.

# **Further Learning**

# A. Declining

There are different expressions to use when you can't help a person. You can choose whether or not to add a reason.

#### **Useful Phrases**

- I'm sorry. I can't. (Add a reason if you want to.)
- I wish I could, but I can't. (Add a reason if you want to.)
- I'm sorry. I'm busy right now. (Use this for an immediate request.)
- I'm sorry. I'm not available. (Use this for a request in the future.)
