Describing a Person (general appearance)

Read the dialogue, and practice with a partner.

A: You know Angela, don't you?

B: Angela? What does she look like?

A: She's tall and thin. She has long, brown hair.

B: How old is she?

A: I'm not sure. She's in her twenties, I think.

B: Oh, the Angela that works at the bookstore?

A: Yes, that Angela!

B: Yes, I know Angela. She's very pretty.



Describing a Person (personality)

Read the dialogue, and practice with a partner.

A: What's your new teacher like?

B: He's great. He's really **funny** and **outgoing**.

A: That's good to hear. Is he strict?

B: No. He's pretty **easygoing**.

A: Do you think you'll learn a lot from him?

B: Yes, he's very **knowledgeable**. He has been teaching for many years.

A: He sounds like a great teacher.

3. Describing a Person (clothing)

Change the information in bold to different information. Practice again.

A: Do you see a small boy in a blue raincoat?

B: Hmm. What color **pants** is he wearing?

A: He has black jeans on. He's also wearing a red baseball cap.

B: Oh, I think I see him. Is he wearing **rubber** boots?

A: Yes!

B: He's right there. (*points*) Over by the big slide.
