

Going to the Pharmacy

In this lesson, you will learn useful vocabulary and phrases to use at the pharmacy. A pharmacy is sometimes called a drugstore. Don't be afraid to ask a pharmacist lots of questions about medication and medical problems.

Notes:

- **Rx** means *prescription*
- **x** means *time/times* (how often)
- **per** means *each*
- **Qty** means *quantity* (how many)
- NDC means National Drug Code
