Did you know?

The term "spot" has several meanings in the English language. It can be used as a verb or a noun. It is also part of an idiomatic expression.

- 1. When used as a verb the word "spot" means to find and see. EX: Can you spot the mistake?
- 2. It can also be used as a noun meaning place. EX: I lost my spot in the line.
- 3. It is also used as an idiom "on the spot" (to not give someone any time to prepare or respond). EX: He put me on the spot when he asked me to marry him in front of his whole family.
