CBP Officer: I see. Where will you be staying while you're in the country?

Mr. Lepac: I'll be at the New Continental Hotel.

CBP Officer: Have you been to the United States before?

Mr. Lepac: No, this is my first trip to this country.

CBP Officer: Can I see your passport, please?

Mr. Lepac: Sure. I have my passport right here.

CBP Officer: I'll stamp that for you. I'll also need to see your customs declaration form.

Mr. Lepac: I don't have anything to declare. I haven't brought anything other than my clothes with me.

CBP Officer: All of your paperwork is in order, Mr. Lepac. Keep your documents with you at all times. Have

a good visit.

Mr. Lepac: Thank you.








