QUANTIFIERS

A. Introduction

A **quantifier** is a word that comes before a **noun** (a person, place, or thing). It shows the **quantity** (amount) of that noun.

In the chart below, note that the percentages are only approximate numbers to help you understand the general amounts of each quantifier. Quantifiers have no specific amounts attached to them.

Amount	Quantifier
100%	• all • every
95%	almost allalmost every
90%	• most
80%	manymucha lot oflots of
50%	• some
30%	• several
20%	a fewfewa littlelittle
10%	• a couple
5%	• almost no
0%	• no
depends on context	• each • any

This lesson will focus on the common quantifiers *some* and *any*.

B. Some and Any

Quantifier	Some	Any
Meaning	Think of <i>some</i> as an indefinite number that is about 50% (about half of an amount of a noun). It's not too much and not too little.	The amount associated with <i>any</i> depends on the context. In negative sentences, <i>any</i> usually means none of the noun. In questions, <i>any</i> means some , many , or all of the noun.
When to Use	 in affirmative (positive) sentences before plural count nouns before non-count nouns Note: There might be an adjective or adverb + adjective phrase between some and the noun, but there is never another article such as a or the. 	 in negative sentences in questions before plural count nouns before non-count nouns
Examples	 She borrowed some books from the library. Let's watch some old movies this weekend. We made some rice for dinner. The children want some attention. 	 He doesn't have any free time. They don't want any pizza. Do you have any pets? Does she require any assistance?
Exceptions	 Some can be used in certain types of questions. It is commonly used in questions that are offers or requests. Do you want some more coffee? (offer) Can I get some more fries? (request) 	 Any can be used in affirmative sentences to emphasize there is no specific noun in the speaker's mind. I need a pen. Any pen will do. (I don't care which pen it is.)
	Some has many functions in English. Don't get confused by the use of some as a pronoun, as in the example below. If some is not followed by a noun, it is acting as a pronoun and not a quantifier.	Any also has many functions in English. Don't get confused by the use of any as a pronoun, as in the example below. If any is not followed by a noun, it is acting as a pronoun and not a quantifier.
	You don't need to stop for milk on your way home. I already bought some.	 Can you stop for milk on your way home? I didn't have time, so I didn't buy any.
