#### **Emoji or Emojis?**

The word *emoji* comes from the Japanese words for *picture* and *character*. In Japanese, the plural of *emoji* is "emoji." In English, the acceptable plurals are "emoji" or "emojis." In this lesson, we use "emoji" for plurals. Note that when "Emoji" refers to a language, it is capitalized.
