





Quick and Handy Grammar Review: The 6 Perfect Tenses & Their Time Markers

A. Present Perfect & Present Perfect Progressive

Tense	Present Perfect		Present Perfect Progressive
Diagram			
Form	Have / Has + Past Participle		Have / Has + Been + -ing Verb
Function	An action that starts in the past, continues to the present, and may continue to the future.	An undefined past action (we don't know <i>when</i> the action occurred).	An action starts in the past, continues to the present, and will continue into the future.
Time Markers	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • for • since • all 	(none required, though <i>ever</i> , <i>never</i> , <i>already</i> , <i>still</i> , and <i>yet</i> may be used)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • for • since • all
Example	<i>I have studied English for five years.</i>	<i>I have been to Paris.</i>	<i>I have been living in New York City since 2006.</i>

NOTES

- For** and **all** indicate duration.
 - *They have been traveling **for** six months.*
 - *We've been in a meeting **all** morning.*
- Since** shows the starting point.
 - *He has played the guitar **since** May 2012.*
- Ever** emphasizes "at any time in the past."
 - *Have you **ever** been to Europe?*
- Never** emphasizes "at no time in the past."
 - *I've **never** been to Europe.*
- Already** emphasizes that an action has occurred.
 - *We have **already** read this book.*
- Still** and **yet** signify the intention to do something.
 - *She **still** hasn't finished the assignment.*
 - *She hasn't finished the assignment **yet**.*

B. Past Perfect & Past Perfect Progressive

Tense	Past Perfect	Past Perfect Progressive
Diagram		
Form	Had + Past Participle	Had + Been + -ing Verb
Function	The first past action finished before the second past action.	The first past action continued until the second past action.
Time Markers	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> by the time when before after (Note: The typical past markers <i>last</i> , <i>yesterday</i> , and <i>ago</i> are often additionally used.)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> by the time when before (Note: The typical progressive markers <i>for</i> and <i>since</i> are often additionally used.)
Examples	<i>I had finished dinner by the time he called me last night.</i>	<i>My sister had been studying English for 11 years before she entered university.</i>

NOTE



In English, it is possible to begin a sentence with either an **independent clause** (with the past perfect/past perfect progressive verb) or a **dependent clause** (with the time marker) with no change in meaning. Remember to use a comma when a sentence begins with a dependent clause.

Examples

- I **had finished** dinner by the time he called me last night.*
- By the time he called me last night, I **had finished** dinner.*
- My sister **had been studying** English for 11 years before she entered university.*
- Before she entered university, my sister **had been studying** English for 11 years.*

C. Future Perfect & Future Perfect Progressive

Tense	Future Perfect	Future Perfect Progressive
Diagram		
Form	Will + Have + Past Participle	Will + Have + Been + -ing Verb
Function	The first future action will finish before the second future action.	The first future action will continue until the second future action.
Time Markers	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> by the time when before (Note: The typical future markers <i>next, tomorrow, and from now</i> are often additionally used.)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> by the time when before (Note: The typical progressive marker <i>for</i> is often additionally used.)
Examples	<i>I will have finished dinner by the time she calls me tonight.</i>	<i>I will have been studying for two hours by the time she calls me tonight.</i>

NOTE

In English, it is possible to begin a sentence with either an **independent clause** (with the future perfect/future perfect progressive verb) or a **dependent clause** (with the time marker) with no change in meaning. Remember to use a comma when a sentence begins with a dependent clause.

Examples

- I will have finished dinner by the time she calls me tonight.*
- By the time she calls me tonight, I will have finished dinner.*
- I will have been studying for two hours by the time she calls me tonight.*
- By the time she calls me tonight, I will have been studying for two hours.*

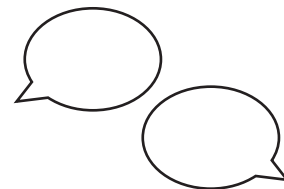

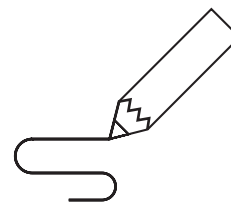
